This meal takes a lot of work to prepare and the cost of all the ingredients has gone up like

all the other foods that we purchase. We want everyone to call in to the hall before noon on Feb. 15 to 209-728-8902 and leave your name and the number in your party because that is the deadline for ordering. We always order enough to accommodate more people and if you do call in late we will try to fit you in. Because of the cost of this meal, it is important that you make a reservation. Then on the evening of the event show up and we will have your name on a list.

Like most of our socials the doors open at 6:00 with dinner about 7:00. Invite your friends as well as your family so this event will be a great success. We will be setting up for the event on the morning of the 18th at 9:00 AM. Show up at the hall that morning and lend a hand. The more the merrier. With more helpers it goes very quickly.

Editor's note: I found that one of the emails that I was using for distribution was incorrect. I found this out from another member who mentioned that one of his friends wasn't getting my emails. I was also told by two members that they had changed their emails. I **am asking all of you with emails to let me know if your email changes so we can keep getting our notices to you.** When we mailed all the Nuggets we asked for any change of address so the Nugget would get to you. Since I email the Nugget and also all special notices if you don't get any emails during the month please let me know so I can see what may be going wrong.

Chispa139 finances: When we have our monthly member dinner I give a report on the current financial status. I have reviewed the expenses for running the parlor in 2022 to show how much it costs to keep the parlor open and make repairs as needed. This year we had some extra expenses because of a leak in the roof. The cost was about \$4,000 which was paid out of the rental fees. We were lucky the rentals this past year had picked up. As all of you realize owning a building you have needed repairs so we have to make enough money on our activities like our socials, our pancake breakfasts, and our other events like Murphys Days sandwich and bar income.

We all pay dues of \$72 but of that amount we pay Grand Parlor \$50 per capita leaving only \$22 remaining to offset some of our costs. The per capita tax will probably go up again this June so

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if that happens we will have less available to offset our expenses. What you may not realize is that income from our socials, member dinners, pancake breakfasts, and bar income is all taxed by the state. The tax is 7.25% which we pay because the tax is built into our price. An example is the member dinner. We charge \$20 but after paying for the taxes and the cleanup we only have a net income \$13.14. Since our average attendance at our member dinners is 37 members the cleanup cost is \$5.40 per person and the tax is \$1.75.

These figures explain why attendance is important at all of our events. All of our members who live in high fire areas know how much insurance has gone up in the last few years. In 2021 we paid about \$3,500 to insure the parlor and in 2022 that was raised to \$7.785. I went through our finances for 2022 and found that the income from all our activities and we spent about \$650 more than we brought in. Since the insurance, utilities, food and beverage costs will also go up we need better attendance to build a reserve. We charged \$50 for the crab feed and are charging \$60 for the Cioppino feed because these are the activities where we can make a nice profit and help us keep the parlor open for our members. I will of course keep mentioning this in future newsletters.
