DECLINING MEMBERSHIP IN NATIVE SONS

Our parlor like all parlors throughout the state is steadily losing members. Steve Ageno found that over the last 10 year there has been an average loss of 260 members per year though out the state. The latest membership total for the state is about

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5,000 members. Some parlors weren't able to pay their per capita and other parlors have closed their doors. There have also been cases where parlors close to each have merged to keep the doors open.

Steve sent a note to Grand Parlor asking if the organization may change their constitution to admit men into the organization even if they weren't born in California. There was an amendment written several times and presented at the annual Grand Parlor meeting in May. Each time it was voted on it was rejected by a negative vote.

I know that when I joined the parlor in 2003 there were more than 160 members in our parlor and as of today we only have 133. Even though we have added many members in that time our numbers keep going down. Steve and I both hope that all of you brothers can talk to friends and neighbors and see if they may have been born in California. I know that Tad Folendorf did some recruiting early this year and brought in new members and Tony Droubay a new member him self brought in 2 members.
